


Daring Joy by Deacon Jackie:

As we reflect on the past year and look forward to the blessings ahead, we are reminded of the power of praise in our lives. The scriptures offer us profound insights into the importance of praising God, and today, we draw inspiration from Jeremiah 31:7-14, Psalm 147:12-20, Ephesians 1:3-14, and John 1:1-18. Jeremiah 31:7-14 speaks of the joy and restoration that comes from praising God. The prophet Jeremiah calls the people to sing with gladness and proclaim the greatness of the Lord. He assures them that God will gather His people, bring them back from captivity, and turn their mourning into joy. This passage reminds us that praise is not just an expression of gratitude but also a declaration of faith in God's promises, regardless of our current circumstances. This passage encourages us to praise God for His eternal plan and the hope we have in Christ, no matter what life throws our way. John 1:1-18 brings us to the heart of our faith-the incarnation of Jesus Christ. John begins his gospel with a profound declaration of Jesus as the Word who was with God and was God. He describes how the Word became flesh and dwelt among us, revealing the glory of the Father. This passage calls us to praise God for the gift of His Son, who brings light and life to the world. It reminds us that our praise is ultimately directed to Jesus, the true light who gives us the right to become children of God, even in the darkest times.

As we meditate on these scriptures, let us be inspired to live lives of praise. Whether in times of joy or sorrow, let our hearts be filled with gratitude and our lips with songs of praise. Let us proclaim the greatness of our God, who restores, provides, blesses, and saves. May our praise be a testament to our faith and a beacon of hope to those around us.

Blessings to you all today and throughout the whole year! May you feel God's grace, mercy and peace; and may you in all circumstances glorify and praise His holy name.

Addressing Suicide: A Call for Awareness and Prevention

In today's society, suicide remains a critical public health issue that affects individuals and communities across the globe. According to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC), over 49,000 people died by suicide in the United States in 2022, making it one of the leading causes of death. This equates to one death every 11 minutes. The prevalence of suicidal thoughts and behaviors is even higher, with an estimated 13.2 million adults seriously considering suicide, 3.8 million planning a suicide attempt, and 1.6 million attempting suicide in the same year.

The heart of the issue often lies in feelings of hopelessness. When individuals feel that their situation is unbearable and that there is no way out, they may see suicide as the only option. This sense of hopelessness can be exacerbated by various factors, including mental health conditions, trauma, isolation, and lack of support.

Addressing suicide requires a multifaceted approach, and one of the most crucial steps is fostering open and honest conversations about the topic. By talking openly about suicide, we can break the stigma that surrounds it and create an environment where individuals feel safe to share their struggles. Awareness and prevention start with understanding the warning signs and risk factors, such as changes in behavior, withdrawal from social activities, and expressions of hopelessness.

Faith communities play a vital role in suicide prevention. By offering support, compassion, and resources, we can help those who are struggling find hope and healing. Encouraging individuals to seek professional help and providing access to mental health resources are essential components of this effort.

As a community, let us commit to being vigilant and supportive. Let us reach out to those who may be suffering in silence and offer a listening ear and a helping hand. Together, we can make a difference and save lives.

We will be offering two free workshops on suicide awareness and prevention. February 28, 2025 will be a two hour community workshop designed to expand suicide prevention efforts by, building a network of support within the broader community for those impacted by suicide. This program raises awareness about the dangers of suicide and explores actionable steps to reduce risks.

March 1, 2025 will be a one-day workshop is designed to equip community leaders with the skills and resources necessary to minister effectively to individuals impacted by suicide. Participants will learn how to create resources, train community members in suicide awareness and basic conversation skills, and extend invitations to those who have experienced suicidal thoughts to share their stories. The workshop will engage participants in exploring how to cultivate a soul-safe culture within their communities. This all day workshop can earn you continuing ed credits.
